ALICE'S ADVENTURES IN WONDERLAND

Your Primary Steps workshop leaders have told us how hard you have been working in class and how much you have learnt. If you continue to dance you may one day perform in a ballet on stage! One of the favourite ballets of the Primary Steps team is Alice's Adventures in Wonderland. We thought this would be a great ballet to share and

hope you find it really inspiring.

Choreographer, Christopher Wheeldon's production of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, was first performed by The Royal Ballet Company in 2011.

The story that is told in this ballet, was taken from a book called Alice in Wonderland written by Lewis Carroll. The main character, Alice, was based on a friend of Lewis Carroll's called Alice Liddell. See her picture below.



Ballet Dictionary

Motif - A movement phrase that is repeated and developed throughout the dance



Some of you may be familiar with the story but here is a quick recap:

The ballet begins at a garden party on a sunny afternoon, when Alice is surprised that her friend turns into a white rabbit. When she follows him down a rabbit hole, events become very interesting...

As Alice travels through Wonderland she meets lots of strange creatures. She stumbles across a tea party hosted by the Mad Hatter and joins the Hatter's guests, the Dormouse and the March Hare – it is a most unusual tea party!

Alice is then swept off her feet by the charming Knave of Hearts, who's hiding from the Queen of Hearts as he stole her tarts. Confusion piles upon confusion. Then Alice wakes with a start. Was it all a daydream?

NEXT STEPS - INFORMATION FOR PARENT

We hope that your child has enjoyed the Primary Steps workshops and is inspired to continue dancing whether it's at home or starting dance classes. Some students will be invited to attend a final workshop at the local Primary Steps centre and after this a number of students will be invited to join the Primary Steps weekly classes. These selected students will receive weekly dance classes during term time (starting Spring 2024) until the end of Year 6.

Every student that is invited will have the opportunity to:

Watch a live performance from a professional dance company in a theatre


Visit their nearest Royal Ballet School Associate centre
